Chip's Chatter



I was thinking about people who suffer from bi -polar disorder. This condition is characterized by extreme mood swings from "high-euphoria like" to "low-depression like". All of us experience changes in our mood throughout the day/week/month. Most of us have a "range" from high to low and stay inside that range. However, when we continually exceed our normal range frequently or for long extended periods of time, it might be time to seek a professional health care provider.

These thoughts came to me as I was reflecting on what it might have been like in Jesus' time during what we call Holy Week. The people were beginning to see Jesus as the Messiah. Though some may still doubt, the crowds who heard his words and listened to his teaching, many came to realize Jesus as the Messiah. But what kind of a Messiah? The people had long been expecting a Messiah who was a mighty warrior who would come and restore the Jews to a position of power in the land and to crush their enemies. Imagine the confusion when Jesus arrived in Jerusalem riding on a donkey on what we call "Palm Sunday."

The people were elated to see Jesus and their hopes and expectations were at an all-time "high." The days that followed were probably bewildering to the people. They were anxious to see Jesus take some sort of action. Instead he was arrested and taken into custody. Put on trial in what we might call a "kangaroo"

court" today. He was beaten, scourged, and humiliated. Then, in an ultimate act, taken to the cross and crucified. Then came the devastating "low" of Jesus' death. The crowds were experiencing a manifestation of what we might label, bi-polar. Then at their lowest point came the resurrection of Easter morning. What a "high" that must have been for those who knew and loved Jesus first hand.

Jesus death on the cross and his resurrection are the ultimate acts of love by the Father. You see, God did this to reconcile each and every one of us to bring us back to him, our Creator.

We have the benefit of knowing about Easter. So, we use the period of Lent to recall our own sin and needs for a savior. We begin Holy Week with Palm Sunday and proceed through the Passion until Easter morning. Even for us, there are periods of times of "highs" and "lows" as we prepare for Easter.

Our Sunday morning services loosely follow this same pattern of "Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday." We always begin our service with a call to worship and a gathering hymn. The hymn and music chosen helps set the stage for the beginning of worship; like the joyful celebration of Palm Sunday. We transition through confession, receive reassurance from our scripture readings, and our teachings of Jesus. The crowds during Holy Week were probably doing similar things as they awaited Jesus' actions.

Following our sermon, we transition to a "down" time of prayers and intercessions, and ask God for help in our lives. Next comes our expression of thanksgiving for what God has done and is doing in our lives. We conclude our worship with a sending hymn, another joyful hymn to remind us of Easter morning.

The simple fact is this: Our Sunday morning service is actually a repeat of an Easter morning type of celebration and it is this attitude we need to bring to church and share with all whom we come in contact. Just as the crowds continued in the joy of realizing Jesus was alive, we need to carry our joy into our daily living and our activities of life.

In both my home and my office I have two crosses; a Crucifix and an "empty" cross. For me, they are highly symbolic. Every time I look deeply at the Crucifix, I can't help but think of the pain and suffering Jesus went through. He went through it for not only me, but for all of us. I sometimes I think of Him looking down at me from the Cross and saying "I am doing this for you, Chip, give all your sin to Me." I also think of others who feel the same way and can image Jesus using their own names and speaking directly to them. I am also reminded of why this had to be done. It is then I think of taking my own guilt, shame, and sin and placing it at the foot of the Cross. I can confidently let it go knowing I am forgiven and can look forward to that glorious day when we see Jesus face to face.

The "empty" Cross is a reminder that Jesus is alive. As it is written in 1 Corinthians 15:51-57:

'Death has been swallowed up in victory.'

55 'Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?'

56 The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. 57 But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

The "empty" cross represents to me, the Risen Christ.

Some people ask why are there two "crosses"? I like to think they are two sides of a coin. The coin is the infinite love of the Father and his desire to bring us into reconciliation with him. The Crucifix side represents the Passion and Good Friday of the story. The empty cross side is the resurrected Jesus and our victory over death and sin. It is the Easter side of the coin.

As you celebrate Easter this and every year, feel the joy of Palm Sunday but also allow yourself to feel the darkness of Good Friday. Easter morning imagine waking up with a note attached to your pillow that reads, "Dear (N). As of this morning your sin debt to me is marked 'PAID IN FULL.' Sincerely, God."

Now, that's the real joy of Easter.
