Chip's Chatter



I recently caught a portion of a T.V. Evange-list presentation. It was from Turning Point Ministries with Dr. David Jeremiah. Dr. Jeremiah is the pastor at a large church, Shadow Mountain Community Church, near San Diego, CA. I have listened to him for many years. Sadly, I was only able to listen to just a few minutes that day. In those minutes, he got me thinking about the past. Dr. Jeremiah commented that when you read Hebrew, you read it from right to left. The symbolism is that it appears we are going backward. Perhaps looking back into our lives.

I think it is important to look back at our lives and recall both the successes as well as the "other." I believe it is important for us to occasionally do this for a couple of reasons. First, we get to see where our life journey has taken us. I remember some tremendously successful moments that reminded me hard work and never giving up helps us achieve our dreams. I remember the people I have met and remember some wonderful experiences with them. But there is an important caution here. As Sr. Joan Chittister, OSB, writes: "If you cling to the past, the doors to the future remain closed." The operative word here is "cling." Holding on with a tight grip.

Another reason to look back is to see what happened during times of stress and struggle. Where did it take us? What did we learn? How were we changed? Many times, the duration of the stress and struggle was significant. It became our personal "desert"

experience. It is here we find God does his best work with us while we are in the wilderness. This fact, alone, should give us hope whenever things seem bleak and hopeless.

But looking back must not be just about remembering events, good and "other." We need to thoroughly examine the good and well as the "other". If we look hard enough, we can find God is present at all times; good and "other". If you hadn't guessed it by now, this is the whole purpose of this exercise of looking back. You will find He has been guiding and leading us all along. In fact, He is leading us to even greater possibilities.

William Barclay writes: "Someone has said that many people regard religion as belonging 'to the ambulance corps and not to the firingline of life.' Religion to them is a crisis affair. It is only when we get life into a mess, or when life deals them some knock-out blow that they begin to remember God. We must all go to Jesus for he alone can give us the things we need for life; but if going and these gifts do not produce in us an answering love and gratitude there is something tragically wrong. God is not someone to be used in the day of misfortune; he is someone to be loved and remembered every day or our lives."

One of the best ways to help us review our lives from time to time is through a personal journal. There are no rules on how to journal. Just simply write what you sense, feel, and are experiencing. The late Dr. Charles Stanly highly encouraged us to record these events

so that we may look back from time to time and see how often God was in the presence of the events of our lives.


The practice of the spiritual life takes discipline. In our looking back we are able to review our spiritual life as well as the events along life's journey. That discipline will bring us joy where there was sorrow. Hope when we feel hopeless. It brings us into a close loving relationship with our faith and with others. We learn to serve others just as Christ came to serve and not be served. In other words, this discipline puts things in order for our lives. Rather than complain or cry about the past, we can look at those as opportunities and patience to bear life's burdens as ways to bring glory to God. As you look back think of how many times you prayed a prayer of thanks. You may also remember prayers of lament. It has been said that for every prayer of thanksgiving, there are ten thousand prayers of lament.

In the work place, we often experience an "annual review" with our boss. We should look at our time of looking back as an individual "annual review" with God. Allow Him to point out the "good" and the "other." Confess the "other" if needed, and move forward, knowing you walk continually in His Grace.

The amazing thing that happens after such a "review" is you re-discover your enthusiasm for the faith. Your enthusiasm for your friends and church is uplifted and they are uplifted by you. Enthusiasm is contagious. Enthusiasm is what drives our "servant heart" to reach out to the community and welcome others. Rather than worrying about spreading COVID or some other disease, let's

spread enthusiasm in massive doses.
