Chip's Chatter



I have had this thought rolling around in my head for the last couple of months. It is a serious question we all need to ask. Here it is: Is the church still relevant or is it (or has it) become(ing) irrelevant?

I am especially prompted to think about this idea based on the events over the last several years, but more importantly over the last few weeks and months. A lot of us today tend to blame the reduction in church attendance as a post COVID result. But I ask, there has to be more to it than post Covid. It is well accepted most church attendees during COVID found "TV church." Following the re-opening of worship, several (30%) are not returning to in person worship but have instead, developed a habit of TV church (or perhaps no church attendance at all). Certainly, the post COVID explanation is easy to understand. But I wonder if there is far more going on here than we first thought.

For most of us, church attendance, and just as important, church participation was an integral part of our culture and our family life. Church was very relevant. In many churches, Sunday morning services were discussed "over the water cooler" on Mondays. From 1974 until 1978, while serving in the USAF, I was a member of a small Presbyterian Church in Tacoma, WA. I sang in the choir. My commander was a frequent attender. Many times, on Monday morning, he would come into my office to comment on Sunday's music and how much he liked it!

For the last nearly 40 years I have noticed a change. Rarely do we talk about Sunday's worship experience with our friends, let alone

our families. Over these last years it seems discussion of church, beyond Sunday, was frowned upon. Some even try to claim the government prohibits such conversations. I worked for a private company following my flying career. The company clearly stated it was a Christian company. Church was very relevant to the owner. Once a week we held a Bible study in the conference room. Many of my co-workers objected stating it was illegal!

How does this lack of relevancy translate to today's world? For me, I see it in the tremendous disregard of ethics and values. As Christians, not only do we need to "talk the talk," but also "walk the talk." By that I mean we don't need to "preach" our values, nor do we need to constantly give our "testimony" to others. Instead, it is by our conduct that we are known. People who are ethical and have firm values are people we naturally gravitate towards. So I ask, "Where are the ethics and values demonstrated in our society today?" Shouldn't our leaders be walking examples of outstanding of ethical and value- based behavior?

A few days ago, concrete evidence came to light indicating many leaders at the highest levels of our government are sorely lacking in ethical and value-based behavior. They may even be guilty of crimes, but there seems little desire to prosecute them. I am just as upset as the next person when I read a report that took 6 years to come to a conclusion showing a false accusation and the involvement of other leaders perpetrating this lie.

But I digress. It seems to me we have become a ship without a rudder. We have become a society in which church and values and ethical

behavior are a thing of the past. I suggest the decline of membership and related attendance has far more to do with the church becoming irrelevant than did the recovery from COVID. Some of us who are students of endtimes prophecy see this as a possible indication of the approaching Rapture of the church and the Glorious Second Coming of Jesus. We are truly living in turbulent times as prophesized.

I believe the most profound impact on creating this idea that the church is irrelevant comes from the segment of Christianity that strongly promotes cultural accommodation. I recently heard a speech on this subject and the presenter offered specific dates and decisions towards cultural accommodation. There is a saying that goes "If you allow everything, pretty soon you will stand for nothing." That is what cultural accommodation taken to the extreme does.

Is there anything we can do about this development of an "irrelevant" church? I believe the answer is YES. We need to stand up for our Christian values. We need to challenge our leaders to do the same. We need to get involved, especially at the local level. But we need to do it as kind and loving people challenging the leaders. When the School Board insists on teaching "mush" to our children we need to attend School Board meeting and voice our opinion. Furthermore, we need to read and study our Bibles. Take every opportunity to learn, regardless of our age. Our Seekers group is a good place to start. Really listen to the teachings at Sunday morning worship. Ask questions if you don't understand.

But there is one thing above all else. We need to pray. We need to pray for our leaders, our nation, and the world. We need to pray for a spiritual revival in the land. In so doing, we will stand up for God. If we fail, I don't want to contemplate what will happen. Here's what

30 "I looked for someone among them who would build up the wall and stand before me in the gap on behalf of the land so I would not have to destroy it, but I found no one. 31 So I will pour out my wrath on them and consume them with my fiery anger, bringing down on their own heads all they have done, declares the Sovereign LORD." Who is the intercessor in standing at the gap? God seeks intercessors not because he needs us, but because he has chosen to govern through the prayers of his people. Intercession is not an option. It's God's way of working. Ezekiel 22 shows us that intercessors "who would build up the wall and stand in the gap" are critical.

Here is a warning from God found in 2 Chronicles 7:14. It also comes with a word of hope. A word of hope so desperately needed in these times of upheaval.

¹³ "When I shut up the heavens so that there is no rain, or command locusts to devour the land or send a plague among my people, ¹⁴ if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land.

My prayer is that, together, we can make the church relevant again to our friends, our community, our state, and our nation.

Scout Troop #25 is our Benevolance for the month of June



Scout Troop 25 of First Presbyterian Church in Bemidji continues to grow! We have meetings every week, campouts every month, and we throw in extra day outings and service projects here and there. Over the last 12 months, we have had 11 new Scouts join our Troop. We have also had a few age out or find other things to do. Overall, we have grown to a membership of 35 Scouts. We also continue to have a strong contingent of adults who continue be wonderfully committed to the success of our program.

We have had lots of fun outings in recent months. In August, we took 14 scouts and 4 adults on a canoe adventure through the Boundary Waters. In October, we held our annual "Bushcraft" campout southeast of Bemidji. At Bushcraft, the Scouts sleep in shelters that they construct themselves and cook over fires rather than stoves. In December, we spent a weekend in Duluth touring an art museum, the maritime museum, and the lift bridge, and we did a service project cleaning a large church.

In January, we held our annual Lock-In at the church. In February, we attended the Klondike Derby near Virginia, Minnesota. At the Klondike, the Scouts competed against other Troops in various Scout skill competitions. We camped at nearby Camp Leander in the deep snow — all scouts and adults making snow shelters and spending a brisk night out. We had a back-up shelter if it was needed, but just like last year, every Scout camped outside all night! It was another nice weekend for building self-confidence!

In March, we held a sledding campout at Shingobee Recreation Area near Walker. In April, we had about 20 Scouts at our annual "New Scout" campout at Camp Nushka on Cass Lake.

During the fall, we also had fun with Welding merit badge. Ehren and Britt Inkel were kind enough to teach us and let us practice welding in their garage. During the winter, we did skating merit badge, and we are just finishing up architecture merit badge right now.

Every spring, we introduce our new Scouts to Scouting and camping, and we are now starting up Cycling merit badge for the summer. At the end of the summer, the troop will take a 50 mile bike ride on the Mesabi Trail, all to be completed within 8 hours.

This June, one of our Scouts is on staff with NYLT (National Youth Leader Training), and 4 or 5 of our Scouts will attend this week-long training near Duluth. NYLT has been a wonderful program and has helped several of our Scouts in recent years gain strong leadership skills.

In July, we will spend an adventurous week at Camp Wilderness. We have about 20 Scouts signed up to attend summer camp this year.

As you all know so well, Scouting is a tremendous program for growing responsible, strong, independent, and resourceful young people who will be the leaders of our future. Thank you, First Presbyterian, for being our sponsor and for your support of our Bemidji kids!
