The other day I was going through some of my US Air Force memorabilia and came across manuals for all the airplanes I had flown. In each of the aircraft's operating manual was a section dedicated to emergencies and emergency procedures. Each manual this mantra, drilled into us nearly every day. When dealing with emergencies, three basic rules applied:

Maintain aircraft control Analyze the situation Take appropriate action

three simple rules could be

These applied to nearly every situation from emergencies to normal operations. Maintain aircraft control. Analyze the situation. Take appropriate action. For some emergencies you have to take immediate steps and those steps had to be memorized. These critical action items were printed in **BOLDFACE** letters. Once a week, we had to full out a slip of paper with all the boldface items. It had to be 100% correct, including dashes, commas, and periods. For non-boldface items, we had time to consult our checklist to address the problem. In the world of commercial airlines, they use the terms "Normal" and "Abnormal" procedures. Steps that needed to be committed to memory where called "Memorize Items." We were tested every 6 months in the simulator to ensure we had the correct procedures. I guess the airline world got too nervous using the term "emergency." I must say I liked the USAF approach much better.

My point to all of this is I wonder if is possible to have a simple, quick, and short step to get our lives back on track whenever we have deviated from God's word. In other words, where is it written about the "basics of Christianity?" Someplace I can go and read and get the message without deep theological study. If so, where would we look?

The first source, of course, is God's written word to us in the Bible. Think about this: In our Pew Bibles in church, there are 1089 pages for the Old Testament and 317 pages for the New Testament. While the Bible is the best source of all, it can take some length of time to search the answers.

In our denomination, we are guided by the Presbyterian Book of Confessions. That book is 465 pages long and contains our church's statements of faith from the very beginning. Next is our Presbyterian Book of Order that not only describes how Presbyterians "operate" it also contains shorter statements of what we believe. The Presbyterian Book of Common Worship is yet another source, but it is 410 pages long. Our "Glory to God" Hymnal is 1018 pages in length.

Each hymn is based on the great foundations of the faith. I think I am now getting closer to the "back to basics" questions.

For me, however, nothing can more simply and easily state the fundamentals of the faith than the Creeds of the Church. We regularly use the words of the Apostle's Creed. We save the Nicene Creed for special occasions. Other churches us the Nicene Creed regularly and save the Apostle's Creed for special occasions. Sometimes words in the Creeds are slightly adjusted but the meaning always remains the same. For example, I know of one denomination that regularly uses the Nicene Creed has changed the "we believe....." to "I believe."

Going back to the pilot analogy, I would summarize things like this:

The Bible is our Operating Manual. It describes normal day to day life for a believer. It also has sections giving us direction and guidance during times of "emergency". With the Bible in our hands, we are able to "Maintain (Aircraft) Control." Looking through the lens of Scripture, we can "Analyze the situation". And following the teachings of Jesus and the Prophets, we learn to "take appropriate action."

Now, we come down to the critical action BOLDFACE items. Some might suggest we memorize as many verses of scripture as we can. Being able to quote scripture is an invaluable tool, especially during times of spiritual warfare. Jesus used this tactical when He was tempted by Satan in the wilderness. This might be a great and wonderful idea for some, but I need something a little simpler and easier to recall. The two BOLDFACE items common to us all are: The Apostles Creed and the Lord's Prayer. When we say the Lord's Prayer, we are taking our situation directly to the Creator. Because of Jesus' atoning work, we have a direct line of communication with the Father. Secondly, the Apostle's Creed (or Nicene Creed if you prefer) is a statement of our faith for the hope we have in Jesus.

I have two additional prayers. The first is Psalm 70; "O God, come to my assistance. O Lord, make haste to help me." The second is "Lord have mercy!" I say these prayers repeatedly until the sense of emergency passes. These two prayers are very effective to combat spiritual warfare. I also use them when I anticipate a spiritual attack.

So, the next time trouble strikes remember these three steps:

### **Maintain Control**

Recall and remind yourself that God is in complete control. You need to be familiar with your Bible which is your operating manual. Start with the book of Psalms and proceed to the Gospels, the Book of Acts, and Romans.

### **Analyze the situation**

Look through the lens of scripture to see what is really going on. Ask yourself if this emergency is a result of my action (sin); spiritual action from the Enemy of our souls; or is God pruning me for further work in the kingdom.

### Take appropriate action

Pray. Then listen to and for the Holy Spirit to guide you. Test the response using scripture. Use your BOLDFACE actions when needed. As things begin to come under control, rest calmly in the arms of Jesus knowing you are never alone, the Holy Spirit is with you.

"Do you realize what a peaceful life you can live if you decided to live like this? Do you realize how relaxed you can be, how free of stress? Honestly.

It's so helpful for me to remind myself: He is the One who is unfathomable. He is unsearchable. I'm neither."


